## The Rector's Report

## **Jesus said, "Come, Take Up The Cross and Follow Me."**

On Ash Wednesday, in Christian churches throughout the world, priests and worship leaders will invite their congregations to the observance of a holy Lent. The Book of Common Prayer suggests for such an observance: self-examination and repentance; prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and reading and meditating on God's holy Word. These are all elements of a healthy spiritual practice for regular use throughout the year. During Lent they are just more so.

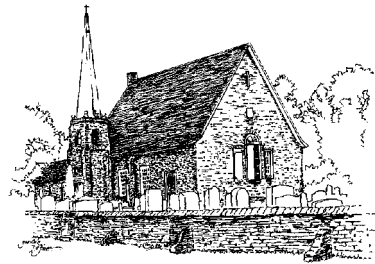
In several Gospel passages, Jesus is quoted as saying that if any want to become his followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow him. What is Jesus asking of us disciples when he says to take up our cross?

I often refer back to a clergy group in which I participated as a curate in southern Rhode Island. In a discussion with other local pastors, an American Baptist minister remarked, "Jesus died on the cross so we don't have to." I think there is

much truth to what he said. Few in the world are asked to be martyrs, that is not what God asks of us. Our faith reveals that through the cross of Christ, the Lamb of God, the sins of the whole world are taken away.

Christ died for our redemption, our crucifixion is neither necessary nor desired.

But there may be aspects of our life that need to die in order that we may more fully live and more faithfully follow Christ. These might include our fears, attitudes, prejudice, materialism,

addictions -- anything that detracts from recognizing God's loving presence in our lives and from more fully serving Christ. This is the sacrifice that we are asked to make as we take up our cross and follow Jesus. By an observance of a holy Lent, we can make these sacrifices and take up the cross of Christ, which we know is not a burden but sets us free.

An old-fashioned Lenten hymn often comes to mind this time of year. It is one that can be found in our African-American Hymnal Lift Every Voice and Sing II. In the refrain of the hymn The Old Rugged Cross we sing,

*"So I'll cherish the old rugged cross,  
Till my trophies at last I lay down;  
I will cling to the old rugged cross,  
And exchange it some day for a crown."*

# CHRIS'S CORNER

The next time you are at St. George's, I invite you to check out the base of the lamppost which is located to your right as you approach the parish hall.

What you will find is a collection of objects: two stones, a shell, a piece of dark sea glass, fragments of pottery and even two nails.

What are these and what are they doing there? They are "sacred objects," placed there by anonymous people who are seeking to commemorate, in some way, their visit to what they perceive to be a sacred place, St. George's Church.

I have never actually seen anyone place an object there. No one has ever told me that they have done so. But I do know that, if they were removed, they would be replaced in time with other "sacred objects," left by other people seeking to commemorate their visit to this sacred place.

What is so fascinating to me is that I have seen this practice of leaving stones or other objects in other places and in other locations which people perceive as having some deep significance or even sacred quality. When I used to go hiking at the Delaware Water Gap in upstate New Jersey, I would encounter a whole forest of stone cairns set up on the shore of Sunfish Pond, left by anonymous hikers who had responded to the same need to "mark" their own sacred place in God's open country.

This need to "mark" sacred territory

seems to be part of the human condition. We find it in Scripture as the Old Testament Jacob sets up an altar to commemorate the place where he saw the angels of God ascending and descending (Gen. 28:18) and Jesus remarked on one occasion that if people were not allowed to express their spiritual longings, "the very stones would cry out" (Lk 19:40).

The phenomenon of setting up stones reminds us of a fundamental truth about human nature, that we are by *nature* religious. Religion (or spirituality, if you prefer) is not for human beings an "add-on." It is who we are. We may ignore our spiritual leanings but inevitably they will seek an outlet, if only in the form of stones at the base of a lamppost.

This time last year, the ministry was a divine spark, not yet realized. We can not even imagine what God has in store for us this year! Thank you to all who have participated with your prayers, gifts and personal interaction, realizing that in serving the people marginalized by our society we are serving Christ himself.

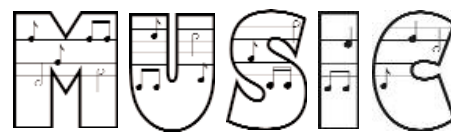
When I returned from the service and took a trip to Quebec with a couple of friends, we took a bus tour of the city. Behind the driver sat a rather large, well-dressed man and a young man that turned out to be his nephew. Wherever we stopped to look at anything, the man very loudly would proclaim that back home this same sight was much bigger and better. On the bus for all to hear, he continued his bragging of the things back home in Texas. My companions and I looked around and were very embarrassed by the conversation. Also, on the bus with us was an older lady with two young girls about our age. After the tour, we spoke with them and apologized for the man's behavior. We invited them to go with us to visit the

shrine at Saint-de Beupre. We found out they were from Toronto and this was their first visit to Quebec as well. We only hoped that they were not viewing all Americans in the manner that we felt to be ashamed of on that tour bus.

Sometimes we feel much like that when we talk of denomination differences in the church. We may boast of our denomination as being the chosen or the best. I can't stop but wonder what God must think of us for thinking thoughts or even discussing any thoughts like that. The apostle tells us to love one another as Jesus had instructed us. He exhorts us to honor one another above ourselves. That is, to be humble and enjoy all the potential in others. This seems to me to be a far different approach than competition although it sometimes comes out in competition. I watched a cross-country race when in high school and a runner stopped just short of the finish line and encouraged a fellow runner to pass him and then he followed across the finish line. When I inquired about it, he simply told me he had earned a letter in the sport and the other runner had a last chance to earn a letter by coming in ahead of him. I think this was a turning point for me in the lesson of humility.

*Pray: Lord and Father of all, help me to grow in humility that I may be a faithful servant and honor those around me. Help me to yield when I should, lend when you call me and be always attentive to my surroundings. Keep my tongue and my thoughts from boasting and let me speak of the best of others at all times. ## Education For Ministry Meets Wednesdays at Noon

Currently, EFM meets at All Saints' on Wednesdays from noon to 3 p.m. EFM is a four-year program that commences each year in September. Enrollees commit to one year at a time. We encourage anyone interested to join us for a class.

In an earlier EFM article, I presented the importance of theological reflection (TR) our EFM journey. TR is supposed to make us reflect on everyday occurrences and relate the experience to scripture. In December, I presented a TR to the group that reflected on the Christmas Cookie for prisoners program.

I encountered hostility and resentment from people when I tried to discuss this program. The feeling seemed to be that prisoners are neither worthy of nor deserve Christmas cookies because they are in jail. I had a discussion of my dismay with this reaction with someone who does an AA support group in a prison. Father Simon overheard this conversation and simply stated, "Matthew 25." On a subsequent Sunday, Father Simon asked, "Do you want to be a sheep or do you want to be a goat?"

In our EFM session in mid-December, we focused on my dilemma and on Matthew 25:31-46. Aren't we all in a prison, even if it doesn't have bars? Do we do unto the least of these who are members of the family? And, what is the burden on those of us who

participate in programs such as the Cookies for Prisoners? Is it enough that we feel that we are a sheep?
