The Rector's Report

Jesus Said, "Go, Your Faith Has Made You Well."

What a glorious holy season of Lent, Holy Week and Easter we have been sharing at All Saints' Church & St. George's Chapel. Father Simon again designed a challenging, thought provoking Lenten Series that was very well attended. Our worship times together have been reverent, joyous, and even transcendent. Hundreds of neighbors and guests have joined our parish family members in being nurtured by the word and sacraments through our sacred ministry of hospitality. And dozens of us enjoyed the hospitality of the diocese and experienced a remarkable visit by our Presiding Bishop, one that we won't soon forget.

We are called, and we are fed, and we are sent. Throughout these seven weeks of Easter, our Sunday scripture readings include passages from The Acts of the Apostles. Written about fifty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ by the same author as The Gospel According to Luke, Acts recounts the adventures, witness and ministrations of the apostles and early disciples. Empowered by the Holy

Spirit, the early disciples spread the Good News of Christ throughout the Middle East and Mediterranean, teaching the crowds and curing the sick.

Like those early disciples portrayed in The Acts of the Apostles, we are called by

God into the fellowship of Christ, we are strengthened by the Holy Spirit, and we are sent far and wide to do God's work. The resurrected Christ is alive in us, and we are the hands, feet and voice of Christ in our generation. Through the grace of God, our parish family bears a strong witness in

the wider community to God's unconditional love and mercy.

In the Gospel of Luke, there is a scene described that takes place as Jesus journeys with his disciples toward Jerusalem. He healed ten lepers and sent them on their way. One returned to thank Jesus, and Jesus said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

Your faith has made you well. I hear the voice of Jesus saying the same to us. Our faith has not always cured us and our loved ones in ways that we have hoped and prayed. But we have been healed in ways that are most important, the parts of ourselves that are eternal have been made well. And together we return to Christ to thank him. And he says, "Go now and do the work of God's Kingdom. Your faith has made you well."

CHRIS'S CORNER

'You Are My Beloved'

"You are my beloved ... with you I am well pleased." (Mark 1:11)

All Saints' and St. George's members who had the privilege of going to Wilmington on Tuesday, April 7, and hearing Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori speak in the Cathedral will remember her powerful message on the topic of affirming one's self and others.

How would the world be different, the Presiding Bishop asked, if we meditated on God's words to Jesus on the occasion of His baptism and applied them to ourselves? God's words were, "You are my beloved ... with you I am well pleased" (Mk. 1:11 and Lk. 3:22). Also, how would our relations with others be different, she wondered, if we had these words in mind every time we encountered another person, and thought to ourselves, this person is God's beloved; with him/her, God is well pleased.

We live in a self-improvement culture, you and I. Go to the local newsstand and check out the magazines, especially the men's and women's magazines. If the magazines are an accurate reflection of who we are and who we want to be, it seems as if all that men in America want to do is build better abs and all the women want to do is de-clutter their houses and lose weight. Don't get me wrong. Self-improvement is a worthy goal. If de-cluttering one's house or building great abs helps one feel better about oneself then I suppose that's all to the good. But there is also an implied and somewhat insidious subtext that seems to be part of any over-emphasis on self-improve-

ment, and that is the implication that there is something fundamentally wrong about me. The problem is, once I de-clutter my house or build great abs or go on a diet or whatever, there is always still one more thing I have to do to *really* be right with myself and with God.

As the Presiding Bishop reminded us, Scripture says that we are created by God as fundamentally *right*. We don't have to *do* nothing to justify our existence. If we want to buff up or lose weight or clean up our house, that's fine, but it does not affect our fundamental rightness with God, which has existed from the beginning of our creation and which will exist to the end of time. The Presiding Bishop reminded us of the Creation Story in the first chapter of Genesis, in which God created the world, along with the human race and declared the whole creation, humans and all, to be "very good" (Gen. 1:31). This fundamental rightness of ourselves with God is a good thing to be reminded of from time to time, especially in a culture of continuous "self-improvement," in which we are often far tougher on ourselves than God is on us.

And so, the next time you feel down or discouraged, remind yourself of this truth: I am indeed God's beloved. With me, God is well pleased. And if I want to clean the house, that's just a nice bonus!

Meditations

Read Phil. 4:10-20

Phil 4: 19 *And my God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus.*

When I was a young boy, before entering school and the first couple of years of school, I lived on the south side of the city of Stamford, Connecticut. I grew up in an Irish-Polish neighborhood. I was part of a group of children of nine boys and three girls. We were a mixed group of children of different backgrounds. None of us knew it at the time, but we would have been labeled as the poor section of town and maybe those on the “wrong side of the tracks.”

A couple of years ago, I touched base by phone with my closest friend. We talked of old times and the camaraderie we had together. He shared with me he had spoken with his late brother and told him how poor we were back then. His brother told him, “We weren’t poor back then, we were all in the same boat.”

As I reflected back, I never knew a time of need. I remember having family Christmas and stockings and presents. Thanksgiving there was always a bountiful table and we always had a stranger share the meal with us. I lived in a home with two brothers who were in trade school and soon would leave. My sister was finishing high school and would soon elope. My mother took in laundry and rented out a spare room to make enough

money for us to get by. It was an age when we had a coal cooking-heating stove, a handringer washer, an ice box, a milkman and in the summer, a vender with a truck to come through the neighborhood selling produce.

Most all of us went on to better our lives and feel we have done better than we deserve. I believe that God has led each of us in our lives to the great providence we enjoy. Not only did we all care for one another and do many good things together, but we also grew spiritually together. I remember going to the Catholic church with my Irish friends and when we were a little late, we would go to the Polish Catholic church. Since I was alone in that department, I got to go to different denominational churches with my school friends. Today, I look back and believe all this growing up, God was always there and provided for my future. I believe He is still working with me now as I am yet incomplete.

Pray: *Dear Heavenly Father, Creator of all this. Thank you for the greatest gift of your Son, Jesus Christ. Help me always to be thankful that you have provided the way for me through Christ our Lord in whose name I pray. Amen*

'Ordinary People' Subject Of Last Book Club Meet

The last meeting of the Book Club before the fall will be on Wednesday, **June 3 at 5:30 p.m.** at St. George's when we will discuss *Ordinary People As Monks and Mystics* by Marsha Sinetar. The books are available at \$11.95 each at Brouseabout in Rehoboth Beach. Our discussion of *Ordinary People* will serve as an excellent segue into our upcoming summer course (see below).

Ordinary People is an account of everyday individuals who've decided to live their spiritual lives in a more intentional fashion, by simplifying their lifestyles and by incorporating traditional spiritual practices into their lives. By going against the grain of our "muchness-and-manyness" culture, they reinvigorated their spiritual lives and discovered new aspects of themselves. Morton Kelsey, an Episcopal priest and author of many books on the spiritual life, said, "*Ordinary People as Monks and Mystics* is an interesting and novel approach to the fascinating subject of finding one's spiritual way. It speaks very simply to the rising quest of many people to find a more spiritual meaning in (the) universe."

During the summer, All Saints' & St. George's adult education will continue with a five-part series on "The Mystic Roots of Christianity," starting on **Wednesday, June 24** and continuing on Wednesday evenings throughout July.

The course will look at the great

Christian mystical tradition, tracing its beginnings in Scripture and continuing throughout the Middle Ages and up to the present, as exemplified by such individuals as Thomas Merton.

We will also discuss and provide practical guidance for understanding and taking part in traditional mystical practices, such as working with one's dreams and also meditation.

Mysticism in other traditions, such as Islam, as well as the relation between mysticism and some aspects of contemporary psychology will also be discussed. This course is for all those who would like to deepen their faith and also to discover new aspects of themselves. Details will be announced in upcoming Sunday bulletins closer to the time, in the June newsletter or speak to the course teacher, Father Chris.
